


Carmel: A Mecca for Inspired Writing

ELAYNE FITZPATRICK ON EARLY BOHEMIA SEACOAST WRITERS



Carmel was both mecca and inspiration for writers in the early 1900s, giving rise in later years to calling this area the "Seacoast of Bohemia."

Elayne Wareing Fitzpatrick is a Carmel Valley author and long-time catalyst in humanities at Monterey Peninsula College. She will talk about Carmel's founding "Nature Bohemians" – from George Sterling and Jack London to Robinson Jeffers and John Steinbeck – during our September 27th General Meeting at 5:00 p.m. in the Vista Lobos Community Room. The meeting is free and open to the public.

Elayne is the author of many books about early writers on the "Seacoast of Bohemia." She perceives her latest book, Nature Wisdom: *Mystical Writers of the Big Sur-Monterey Coast*, as her "legacy." Fitzpatrick describes this book as "a medley of provocative essays about the perennial philosophy linking some unlikely bedfellows: Robert Louis Stevenson, Richard Henry Dana, Gertrude Atherton, Jack London and 'The Bunch' (Robinson Jeffers, Jaime de Angulo, John Steinbeck, Eric Barker, and Henry Miller), with a tribute to the blood conscious mysticism of D. H. Lawrence, and a postscript on the organic psychology of William James."

She'll tell us how, "under the spell of the alternately soft and violent landscape" of our coast, these writers "intuited the awesome power of divinity in Nature" and became what she calls "shepherds" of Pan, the ancient Greeks' pipe-playing, hoof-stomping all-god of Nature.

The author holds a Bachelor's degree in English and a Master's in Philosophy. She was a city desk reporter for *The Salt Lake Tribune*, promotion director of KUED (Utah's public television station), and an associate professor at the University of Utah before relocating to California in 1974 to teach Philosophy and Humanities at Monterey Peninsula College. She is also a freelance journalist who, after raising a family, began traveling to and writing about some of the world's most charming places unspoiled by industrial development.

Other books by the author include, *A Quixotic Companionship: Fanny and Robert Louis Stevenson; Robert Louis Stevenson's Ethics for Rascals; Doing It with the Cosmos:*



Henry Miller's Big Sur Struggle for Love Beyond Sex; Shepherds of Pan (earlier black and white edition of the expandedin-color Nature Wisdom) and Traveling Backward: Curious Journeys and Quixotic Quests Beyond the Youth of Old Age.

An increase in revenue makes cents.

Come the November election, Carmel voters will decide the fate of a sales tax measure placed on the ballot by our City Council as a means to enhance the City's revenue and address long-range projected monetary shortfalls.

For some time, the City of Carmel has been spending more money than it has taken in. Because Carmel has tapped substantial reserve funds over the years, the severity of the financial situation fell under the radar. Up until now, our leaders chose repeatedly to cut city staff and services rather than pursue additional revenue sources.

The cuts have been so deep over the years that our current Council members find themselves painted into a corner because any additional cuts would devastate city services. Prior city councils' actions have left little choice but to look for new revenue in the form of increased taxes. We have a long way to go to dig out of this financial hole in which we find ourselves.

City Administrator Jason Stilwell was tasked by the City Council to do a thorough analysis of where the city is financially, where it needs to be, and what it would take to get there. Stilwell, who holds a PhD in Public Administration, produced a highly professional document that portends a dark financial future:

1. There will be an increasing divergence of anticipated reduced revenue with spending that is needed to meet increasing financial obligations.

2. Even without increasing spending, this divergence is unsustainable and city services and conditions will continue to deteriorate.

3. Our Capital Improvement Plan contains a large backlog of projects and

deferred maintenance on infrastructure with no adequate funding to complete. In June, the City Council adopted a balanced budget, again dipping into reserves to meet obligations, recognizing a shortfall of \$2.75-3 million based on Stilwell's projections. The Council decided to ask voters to approve a 1% sales tax increase for 10 years, estimated to produce \$2 million per year. This decision is consistent with the CRA Board's repeated calls over the years for increasing the City's revenue. This money is needed to continue to provide a quality level of service.

Carmel's annual budget needs to support police, fire and ambulance services to take care of the residents, workers, and visitors on any given day.

> It is anticipated that the balance of the shortfall will be made up by additional monies expected from grants and gifts, along with cost-saving actions such as refinancing CalPERS debts, sharing services with other cities, and adopting lower second-tier retirement benefits for new city employees.

Even if the shortfall can be met with the 1% sales tax increase, this is still a conservative approach to our budgetary problems but is certainly a step in the right direction.

Carmel's annual budget needs to support police, fire and ambulance services to take care of the residents, workers, and visitors on any given day. Depending on the time of year, weather and/or special events, the number of visitors can fluctuate significantly but is estimated at two million per year. Our city budget must also provide city services to take care of approximately 3,600 homes, over 300 businesses, over 32 miles of streets, 10 miles of pedestrian trails, 65 acres of parkland and our beautiful beach. Our city forester must maintain 9,000 city trees in the residential area and 900 trees in our business district. The city is responsible for maintaining 20 city-owned properties, including City Hall, Sunset Center, Forest Theater, two library buildings, Flanders Mansion, the Scout House, fire station, police station, public works and other minor buildings - all in a one-squaremile village.

> It should be noted that all of the 1% tax collected would come into Carmel's coffers and would not be shared with either the state or the county. The 1% increase would restore the sales tax percentage to the July 2011 level before a

temporary state tax expired. And, with a 1% increase, Carmel will still be within the norms of other cities and counties.

The City Council's decision to ask the voters for the 1% sales tax increase was made after a very open, transparent and professional process. The citizens of Carmel can be part of the solution by voting in favor of the increase.

The Board of Directors of the Carmel Residents Association strongly supports the November ballot measure increasing Carmel's sales tax by 1% from 7.25 to 8.25. Without this revenue, Carmel will be forced to make even more cutbacks on personnel and services that will drastically affect the quality and character of our village. Please join us in supporting this important ballot measure by voting YES and encourage your friends and neighbors to do the same.

VILLAGE PROFILE

Ann and Bob Nelson



The truth is that most of us who live in this storied village have come from someplace else. And we're here because we're fulfilling a dream of one day being a part of this small community. Now that you are full-time residents, Ann and Bob Nelson, please tell us where you came from.

BOB: We bought our little house in 1992 with plans to eventually retire to Carmel. And that's exactly what we did two years ago. We came from Berkeley, a city we still have great affection for.

ANN: I taught high school English and Bob was a lawyer. Before Berkeley we lived and worked in Sacramento. Bob continued to practice law and I became a travel agent.

You've been here permanently for just two years. What brought you to the CRA?

ANN: We knew very few people – we were new to the village. Our newfound neighbors stopped by one day with an application for membership. We joined and we've been active in CRA [members] ever since.

BOB: It didn't take long to discover that the Carmel Residents Association has as its priority the interest of the community at heart. It's committed to preserve and enhance what drew so many of us here in the first place. We couldn't be more pleased with our decision to be a part of this organization.

Even before our meeting today we had heard of your generous participation in all kinds of CRA activities.

ANN: Well, it just seemed to happen – and continues to happen. We've helped out at the beach parties, the beach cleanup, the Fourth of July celebration, the wonderful Fiesta – our first last year and again this year.

BOB: Add to that, Ann and I are big fans of "CRA Dines Out." We meet new people every time we sit down to feast in some special Carmel restaurant.

You're both retired. Besides all you do for CRA, what other interests do you pursue?

ANN: I volunteer at the Joining Hands shop in Carmel Rancho. Bob and I both love our library. I help out at the Carmel Foundation. To us it's more than just being residents, we want to participate and contribute to the place we now call home.

What do you think of our new city government?

BOB: We were thrilled to be able to vote for the very first time in this last election.

The fog was so thick – it's August, what else? The fog was so thick that we had to move inside the coffee house for our meeting. We were here to meet Ann and Bob Nelson, new CRA members who have become two of our most ardent volunteers, an attractive couple delighted to be a part of the life and energy and culture of Carmel.

We followed the issues, we attended meetings and we cast our votes. And we're delighted to say we were part of voting for the current administration.

Besides art galleries, jewelry stores and restaurants, what businesses would you like to see in the commercial district?

ANN: Well, you know when we first came here, even before we became fulltime residents, we didn't want anything to change. We could find nothing that displeased us about this little village.

BOB: We feel the same today. I like coffee houses; could always use another one or two. It would be nice to have a traditional bookstore but then we have a terrific one in the Crossroads. Is there a barber in Carmel?

ANN: I think we're both saying that we have no complaints.

BOB: We're just very happy to live here.

And the CRA is happy that you do. Add to that our thanks for all you do for the organization! We'll meet often, if not at a CRA dinner then on the beach or at City Hall listening and/or participating in issues that affect the quality of life in this tiny, beautiful village on the California coast.

Arnold Genthe CARMEL'S FIRST FAMOUS PHOTOGRAPHER

Arnold Genthe is too seldom given the recognition he deserves as one of the artists and writers – the "Bohemians" – who lived and worked in Carmel during the early years of the twentieth century. He was the first in the succession of eminent photographers to reside on the Monterey Peninsula. He made notable contributions toward the establishment of photography as a fine art form when that medium was still in its infancy. And, among other achievements, he was a pioneer in the use of color photography.

Born in Berlin in 1869, Genthe pursued a classical education, assuming he, like his father, would become a university professor. In 1895, as a respite from his studies, he accepted a position as tutor for the son of a wealthy German family living in San Francisco. There he discovered a whole new world. He was intrigued with San Francisco's Chinatown. Without any formal instruction, he purchased a camera to record exotic scenes of that neighborhood, producing images that today are found in major collections of fine photography.

In a remarkably short time, he achieved recognition as a portrait photographer. His newly established studio was soon patronized by prominent San Franciscans and, most notably, by actors, singers, and other artists and entertainers – the subjects who would eventually win him fame.

Genthe developed a new approach to portraiture, abandoning the rigid posturing of traditional portraits. In his autobiography, *As I Remember*, he declared his determination to "show people a new kind of photography... there would be no stilted poses; as a matter of fact no poses at all. I would try to take my sitters unawares, at a moment when they would not realize the camera was ready." He despised "a commonplace record of clothes and a photographic mask."

Genthe's life in San Francisco changed dramatically with the 1906 earthquake and fire that destroyed his studio. His photographs of the aftermath of that disaster are classics. He rebuilt his studio, but became increasingly disaffected with life in San Francisco. From the poet George Sterling, and probably from other fellow members of the Bohemian Club, he heard glowing reports of a new land development, actively seeking home builders who were practitioners of the creative arts – Carmel-by-the-Sea.

His memoirs do not specify the terms of purchase of his Carmel property, but such deals as five dollars down and five dollars per month were offered by Frank Devendorf and the Carmel Development Company to attract artists like Genthe. He chose a lot on Camino Real and Eleventh and designed and built the bungalow he "always wanted to have." In his words, "The sloping roof, following the lines of the distant hills, was shadowed by two great pine trees, the largest in Carmel, and was supported by four large redwood trunks, with the bark left on. A wide porch looked out on the sea. The spacious studio and living room, thirty by sixty feet, with a high ceiling and two skylights, was built entirely of redwood..."

With George Sterling and Mary Austin, Genthe became the first of Carmel's fabled "Bohemians," a group that was soon joined by such luminaries as Jack London, Perry Newberry, James Hopper, Grace MacGowan Cooke, and Sinclair Lewis. In his book, *The Seacoast* of Bohemia, Franklin Walker explains Genthe's attractiveness to this strivingto-be-colorful group. "Arnold Genthe was one of those who glitter while they

walk; erect, striking with his curly hair and firm chin. He was an accomplished horseman...and carried more than one scar from dueling in his student days... He was always a welcome guest at the mussel bakes and abalone picnics of the Carmel crowd, though his behavior was usually marked by a certain amount of protocol. He remained a bachelor, a state that he frankly admitted he favored because it allowed him more freedom... His reputation for success with beautiful ladies...was downright prodigious."

After almost a decade of more or less full-time residence, Genthe moved permanently to New York City. Even though he believed the village was becoming "too popular," undoubtedly his prime motivation was to be among the famous people whose portraits were bringing him increasing renown. Nevertheless, even though Genthe and most of his compatriots spent comparatively limited time here, they fixed, for all time, Devendorf's vision of Carmel as a haven for creative people.



ARE WE IN DANGER OF FLUSHING MONEY **AND** WATER DOWN THE DRAIN?

Permanent bathrooms at the south end of Carmel Beach are becoming more of a reality. Delayed for years by lack of money, the council is hoping for donations and grants to finance the project.

While the two port-a-potties tucked into the cypress trees at Santa Lucia and Scenic Road have never been a matter of controversy, the city wants to install two permanent bathrooms with flushable toilets. The debate is whether to have two ADA bathrooms, or to have 2 unisex bathrooms, one ADA and the other not. Hopefully the bathrooms will have waterless urinals. To conserve water, there will be one hand washing station to serve both bathrooms.

A recent city workshop gathered input from planning commissioners, council members and the public. Comments were passed on to the architect, Robert Carver, to incorporate into the latest of his many architectural renderings. Scenic homeowners don't want to see this structure from their homes and have hired attorney Tony Lombardo to follow the planning stage. The site is problematic because of the prominent Lloyd point which juts out from Scenic Road, the soft, easily eroded soil, and the occasional heavy surf, which can reach Scenic Road at this location. Two benches. commemorating Frank and Marjorie Lloyd are also installed on this site.

The final plan will have to be simple, inconspicuous, and functional, and hidden within the canopy of the existing and future landscaping. The architect will have to take all of this into consideration making for a challenging and potentially costly project for taxpayers.

Homeowners in the southern part of the village provided interesting information. Of 42 who responded to the survey, 38 wondered why the city would install flushable toilets when water is such an expensive and limited resource. That is a good question. After all, what do we really need but to quickly relieve ourselves and go back to having fun running, walking, surfing, biking and playing on the beach and Scenic pathway? Only time will tell how this will all play out.

So why wait any longer? It's easy and it's free. Facebook provides you another way to do the things you already like to do, only with better tools – and that's something to "like."



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
